

All about Subitising



To look at a small number of objects and know what it is without counting

Did you know that subitising...?

- Comes from the Latin 'subito' which means quickly or suddenly
- Helps children to develop pattern recognition
- Is highly efficient for when dealing with small numbers - helps children see how numbers are made up
- Helps lay the foundations for addition and subtraction through children exploring, separating and combining

Things to do when out and about...

- When walking down the street, ask your child to identify how many cars of specific colours they can see
- Can your child spot groups of numbers? e.g. 2 people, 1
 post box, 3 trees, 5 pine
 cones etc.



Things to do at home...

- Play board games using dice ask your child to show you the number they rolled using their fingers
- Bunny ears both you and your child hold both hands up at either side of your head and take turns in saying a number from 0-10.
 You then have to show that number using your fingers. Can you show the number in different ways, using one and two hands?
- Play dominoes this will help your children become familiar with the dot patterns and allow their subitising skills to develop
- Subitising snap create small cards with a variety of dot patterns from 1-6. Play snap and encourage your child to use their subitising skills to recognise the dot patterns quickly
